TIGER CUBS MAKE THEIR PUBLIC DEBUT

Three of the world's rarest tiger cubs (pictured) made their public debut recently at **ZSL London Zoo**, exploring the outdoor paddock of their home at the Zoo's Tiger Territory.

Just a few weeks old, the cubs joined mum, Melati, when she ventured outside to stretch her legs - and they appeared delighted with their new play area!

The cubs, who won't be named until keepers know if they are boys or girls, had been spotted playing in their custom-built cub conservatory area but this was the first time that they'd ventured outside into the main paddock.

After taking cautious steps towards the entrance and with a few encouraging nudges from mum, the trio were soon busy exploring, with one even attempting to climb a fallen tree trunk.

Zookeeper Tracey Lee said: "We were watching the cubs on the hidden cameras in their dens when it looked like they were about to follow Melati outside. We all rushed to the exhibit and were just thrilled to catch them playing outside for the first time.

"We got a real glimpse of their different personalities. Two of the cubs bounded confidently outside while the other one hung back a little and needed a bit more encouragement from mum.

"Melati spends 24 hours a day caring for the cubs, playing with them, feeding them and washing them and only leaves them for a few minutes at a time to eat."

While keepers can't predict when the cubs will be out and about, visitors to the Zoo can still catch six-year-old dad Jae Jae hanging out in Tiger Territory. Like ZSL London Zoo on Facebook for regular updates from the tiger keepers.
